There was no border ditch-and besides this error, Mr. C. fell into two others-having only one ditch where the land needed three-and digging only eighteen inches, where he should have gone down three feet. The land lies on an inclined plain, has a good fall, and might be easily unde to produce two tons of good berdsgrass to the scre. Instead of that, the wild sour grasses have never been eradicated, and it has never yielded over three quarters of a ton of hay to the acre.

These gentlemen are somewhat inclined to look upon drainage as a humbug, when that term is more appropriately applied to the style of their works. It was not more than half done. A border drain is indispensible, in all material, and warranted to give satisfaction.

for thorough drainage, at best, but they are the first advances toward the improvement of wet land, likely to be made by most farmers. It is of great importance that the errors pointed out in these cases should be avoided.

THE CEREALS OF THE UNITED STATES .-A statistical view of American Agriculture recently given in an address delivered by Mr. John Jay, before the American Geographical and Statistical Society, gives a rather discouraging account of the progress of our national agriculture. In many staple products the quantity raised has shown a marked decrease in 1850 (the date of our last census, from which Mr. Jay has obtained most of the purely statistical portions of his work) from that raised in preceding years. Until the census of PROPOSE to make a directory Map of Bedford County from actual surveys, if a sufficient num 1850 there can be no means of obtaining further statistics of the kind, and upless there has been a marked improvement during the last seven years, the condition of our agriculture is not very promising. In New England the culture is rapidly declining, while in the middle States it is nearly stationary, and our chief supplies now come from the northwestern JACOB REED. G. W. RUPP. JOHN J. SCHELL. district. In New York, the crop in 1840 was over twelve millions of bushels, while in 1850 it was but nine millions - a decrease of twenty five per cent. With regard to the products of the entire country, without alluding to any particular State, we find that Tye, oats, Irish and sweet potatocs, bay and tobacco, have steadily decreased. Hops have increased at the rate of five hundred per cent, owing to the enormous consumption of lager beer. Rice has increased at the rate of nearly three hundred per cent. In 1840 the cotton produced amounted to eight hundred millions of pounds, in 1850 to nine hundred and eighty millions, in 1855 to one billion and eighty-eight millions. But the great stople production of the United States, far surpassing in amount even our famed wheat, cotton and tobacco - is Indian corn. Its cultivation has retrograded in no State, and the crop may be roughly estimated at four hundred millions of bushels in 1840 six hundred millions in 1850, over seven hundred millions in 1855, and fully eight hundred millions in 1856.
