NOTICE TO COMMANDING OFFICERS OF COMPANIES, of the 1st Brigade, Sixteenth Division, Penna. volunteers.

The attention of Commanding Officers of Companies is directed to section third, article third, of the Militia Laws of Pennsylvania, the provisions of which have never been complied with, and which are as follows:

"The commanding officer of each and every company of uniformed militia within this commonwealth, shall, on or within five days after the first Monday in May, in each year, deliver or cause to be delivered to the Commissioners of the City or County in his Brigade, and a duplicate copy to the Brigadier General of his Brigade, a roll, alphabetically arranged, of the names and residences of all the Officers, non-Commissioned Officers and Privates of his company, which roll shall be certified by him, upon honor, to include only the names of persons fully equipped, according to the laws of the United States and of this State, and ready for service in his company; and also to report a list in duplicate, similarly arranged, of persons who have for the current year contributed to the funds of an uniformed and organized company the sum of fifty cents, as an equivalent for military service, which list shall have annexed to it an affidavit, signed by the officers of the company, and setting forth that the said sum has been actually paid to the funds of said company by or for each and every person named therein, for the current year, which shall exempt said persons from paying the same to the Collector."
