Recommendations of the Border State Committee.

The committee on the part of the border States have adopted the following propositions:

Recommending the repeal of all personal liberty bills.

An efficient amendment to the fugitive slave law, preventing kidnapping, equalizing commissioners' fee, &c.

That the Constitution be so amended as to prohibit any interference with slavery in any of the States.

That Congress shall not abolish slavery in the territories, etc., or in the District of Columbia, without the consent of Maryland, and the consent of the inhabitants of the District, nor without compensation.

That Congress shall not interfere with the interstate slave trade.

That there shall be a perpetual prohibition of the African slave trade.

That the line 36 deg. 30 min., shall be run through all the existing territory of the United States, and in all north of that line slavery shall be prohibited, and south of that line neither Congress nor the Territorial Legislature shall hereafter pass any law establishing, prohibiting, or in any way interfering with African slavery; and when any territory containing a sufficient population for one member of Congress in any area of 60,000 square miles shall apply for admission as a State, it shall be admitted, with or without slavery, as its constitution may determine.

The committee represented at its meeting the States of Maryland, Virginia, Missouri, North Carolina, Texas, Kentucky, Delaware, Arkansas, Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Pennsylvania, and New Jersey.

Secession of Louisiana.

BATON ROUGE, Jan. 26.-The State Convention, to-day, voted on the ordinance of immediate secession.

At ten minutes past one, the following was declared to be the result of the vote:

Yess, 113 Nays, 17 The Convention then adjourned to New Orleans.

NEW ORLEANS, Jan. 26.-The news of the passage of the secession ordinance created great excitement in this city.

Salutes in honor of the event are being fired and the pelican flag is everywhere unfurled.

Kentucky Legislature.

FRANKFORT, Ky., Jan. 27.-The Legislature yesterday appointed the following Commissioners to meet the Commissioners of Virginia on the 4th of February: James B. Clay, Joshua F. Bell, Gov. Morehead, W. M. Butler, James Garbrie and Charles A. Wickliffe.

North Carolina Legislature.

RALEIGH, Jan. 26.-The House to-day passed a resolution sending Commissioners to Washington, and to meet the Southern Convention at Montgomery, Alabama. It will pass the Senate.

The proceedings, otherwise, were of an uninteresting character.

From Charleston.

CHARLESTON, Jan. 26.-The Legislature has agreed on the sovereign flag of South Carolina. It is to be of a blue ground, with a white oval centre piece, and a golden palmetto tree thereon.

The Senate adopted a resolution, to-day, authorizing the Governor to send volunteers to the assistance of Florida, if needed, in case of a threatened invasion. The number of men is unlimited.
