PENACOLA, Feb. 2.—A truce has been concluded between Lieut. Slemmer and the troops of the seceded States.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 5.—The City Councils of Washington have appointed a Committee to wait on Messrs. Lincoln and Hamlin, the President and Vice President Elect, and receive them in Washington.

General Scott received several threatening letters yesterday, without signature, but, of course, from some rabid secessionists who are incensed at the active measures adopted by the Government under his advice.

The General has changed his quarters from his lodgings up town near the President's House, to the National Hotel, which is near the Capitol.

In the House, to-day, Mr. Boulogne, of the Louisiana Delegation, said that he would not withdraw from the House, but would resign his seat.

He concluded by saying that he would stand by the flag of his country and the Union.

This was greeted with tremendous and long-continued applause from the floor and the galleries. All the rest of the delegation withdrew formally.

The Senate has passed the bill for a twenty-five million loan, and repelling the old fourteen million loan bill last year.

The Senate has agreed to vote to count the votes of the President-elect, chosen at the November election, on the 18th of this month.

Col. Hayne will leave for the city of Charleston this evening. The President's reply to his letter in reference to Fort Sumpter is to give Col. H. N. no satisfaction.

Lieut. Hall U. S. A., also leaves for Charleston and Fort Sumpter to-night, bearing highly important despatches from the Federal Government to Major Anderson.

New Orleans, Feb. 4.—The latest advices from Texas are dated Austin, January 28. The Convention had assembled, but no important business had been transacted.

It was believed that the Secession Ordinance would be submitted to the people on the 20th of February, and a Convention be called to meet on the 21st of March.

The House resolution giving the Government sanction to the Convention was passed in the Senate by a vote of 29 to 6.

LOUISVILLE, February 4.—The officials at the New Orleans Custom House, now in the service of the State, refuse to deliver to the Louisville importers their foreign goods unless the United States Surveyor in this city, will grant cancelling certificates for the goods, the duties thereon to be paid in New Orleans.

The Democrat, the Douglas newspaper in this city, hoisted the National flag over its office to-day.

ALBANY, N. Y., February 5.—The Legislature met in joint Convention, to-day, and proceeded to the election of United States Senator, in place of Dr. Seaward.

Hon. Ira Harris, of Albany, the Republican nominee, was elected. His term of six years commences on the 4th of March next.

STRONG TALK.—The Hon. John P. King, of Georgia, has written a letter on the crisis, to a Committee in Augusta, in that State, in which he says:

"The great difficulty in the way of an *effectual accommodation* is that the great many of our leading men do not want to see the Government in too republican—too free and too weak for them, because they will not obey and submit to it! Their minds are filled with visions of strong and splendid Governments, with the whole country glistening with armor and epaulettes, they wish the people humbled by being loaded down with taxes, and the tolling millions reduced to the use of meat once a week. They are right in one position at least—Such a government would give us peace. Napoleon, with his six hundred thousand men, would execute the Fugitive Slave laws, Neutrality laws, Slave Trade laws, and without submitting them to a jury. He would also collect plenty of taxes, whether received from the customs or not. He would also make short work with some of our noisy Conventions and public meetings, and some of our great men would soon shut themselves up on the Cayenne. I have no wish for such a Government myself, but if the people want a Government—because they will not submit to a weak one—if they want an expensive Government, because they will not pay for it cheaply—if they wish to be governed by force, because they will not govern themselves, in the name of peace let the will of the people be done! I am only one of them and will submit to share their destiny. I am a native of the South. All the good and interests are here—here I have long lived and here I expect to die."
