He had bliss. gained his laurels as a faithful representative of Pennsylvania in the Senate; and the great pro sective measure which had just become a law, and for which Gen. Cameron had toiled unflinchingly for sixteen years, would be remembered to his honor when the highest honors he might earn in the wise administration of the office to which he had just been appointed should be forgotten."

We have never seen so much feeling evinced on any occasion -The people cheered the troops all along the streets, and many followed them to the head of the San Pedro, "where they encamped."

We shall see, before long, a march like that of Napoleon to Paris, on his return from Elba, not of Federal troops, but of some leader of the reaction against the treason of the Gulf States. This cheering of the people of San Antonio at the sight of the old flag, presages the triumph with which it will yet be carried through the whole region now dominated over by the armed minicus of despotism .- Wash. 




