FROM ANNAPOLIS.

ANNAPOLIS, Md., May 11.—The agent in charge of the Winans' steam gun testifies, on examination, that he was on his way to Harper's Ferry, and not going out to practice at Long Reach, as was stated by a Baltimore paper. The gun now guards the viaduct at the Relay House.

Gen. Butler is here to-day. The steamship Empire City has arrived with the remainder of the Thirteenth Regiment, of New York, who are guarding the railroad from Annapolis to Hagerstown.

The Maryland contingent of Federal troops will be called out immediately after the adjournment of the Legislature. There are volunteers enough already to fill the four regiments. This is beyond question.
