A FIGHT IN WESTERN VIR-GINIA.

CINCINNATI, Jan. 6 .- A special despatch to the Gazelte, from Huttonville, Western Virginia, stating that the expedition, consisting of 400 of the 25th Ohio, 300 of the 2d Virginia, and 40 of Bradshaw's Cavalry, sent out by Gen. Mulroy to attack Hunterville, was impletely successful.

They attacked the enemy on Saturday morning, coosisting of four hundred cavalry and three hundred and fifty militia, and after skirmishing an hour, the enemy retreated with the loss of eight killed and wounded.
