High Water. We had heavy rains in this vicinity the latter part of last week. The streams were a good deal swollen in consequence. The Raystown Branch was bank full. Denning's creek overflowed its banks. At Ritchey's a and Bridman's bridges the water was two feet over the road. The water rose to the height of about six feet above high water mark. Travellers were obliged to pass down the east side to the bridge over the river at the turnpike crossing.

Concerning Swine. James Kirby, High Constable, against Capt. Geo. Smith. Mr. Smith's hogs had been running at large in the Borough, in violation of a borough ordinance. On the 12th inst. Constable Kirby seized and put them in the pound. On the same day Mr. Smith directed a boy to open the door, which having been done, he drove the hogs away. Mr. S. refused to pay the constable fees. Constable Kirby brought an action before Esquire Nicodemus for his fees, and the case was tried on Wednesday. Verdict—Two dollars and costs against Smith. Moral—It costs something for hogs to break a borough ordinance.

The Enrollment. From an official report, given in another column, it will be seen that the Boards of enrollment are required to revise and correct the enrollment lists. The different Boards are required to appoint at once enrolling officers, who are to enroll all persons whose names have been omitted; such as shall arrive at the age of twenty years before the draft; or alien who shall have declared their intention to become citizens; persons discharged from the military and naval, and who have not been in the service for two years during the present war; all persons exempted under the act of March, 1864, and not exempted under the act of February, 1864. The Boards of enrollment are required to strike from the enrollment lists, upon satisfactory proof, the names of all persons who have arrived at the age of forty-five years; all who are manifestly physically or mentally unfit for the service; all who are now in the military or naval service of the United States, and all who have been in the military or naval service two years or more during the present war, and been honorably discharged.

He went into the army at the call of his country, in November, 1861; and was in active service up to February, 1864, when, from an attack of the disease which caused his death, he was obliged to go to the Hospital for medical treatment, where he received all the attention that could be rendered, but to all no avail. He took with him into the army that which many neglect, the saving grace of God. Although he was surrounded with wild and reckless companions, yet he always maintained his integrity. When brought down upon the bed of death, he had the consolation and presence of his Friend "who steeth closer than a brother." And while his friends and neighbors are called upon to mourn his death, they have the blessed thought to console them that he has gone to his peaceful home in heaven. I will close this obituary by giving the words of his Chaplain to his father: "He was very patient during all his sufferings, perfectly resigned to the will of God, and he died with the full hope of eternal life beyond the grave." LETTER FROM THE ARMY. List of Killed and Wounded in Company D, 138th Regiment.

CAMP IN THE FIELD, May 18, 1864. DEAR FATHER—As there is a mail going out this morning, and I know you are anxious to hear from me, I will give you a little of the news, and a very little too. We have been put through since we left, but I am all right yet. John got one of his fingers shot off in the second fight. I saw him once again. He has been sent to the rear. Wm. Amick and Wm. Ake were killed. The loss in our Company was about 18 killed, wounded and missing. Will Debaugh is missing but we still hope he may turn up. Will Line, Gray, Stevens, Beard, Steckman, Betts and Allen Cobler are with us and well. If any of your friends inquire for them you can tell them. The Captain is all right. This will be the tenth day we have been under fire. I will now tell you how many are killed, wounded and missing. Killed—Wm. Amick and Wm. Ake. Wounded—John Leonard, Jos. Carle, Miles Smith, Wm. Smith, John Cook, N. Kegg, A. Carl, Harry King, A. Biddle, D. Price, Conrad Claycomb, Wm. Robinson and John Ake. Missing—Joseph Loy, Wm. Debaugh, John Ritchey, C. Gardner. This is the truth and I want you to tell the friends just as I have it here. The news is favorable and we are in good spirits. I have no more time to write. Your affectionate son, R. W. COOK, 2d Lieutenant.

STATE OF PENNSYLVANIA. OFFICE OF THE PROVOST-MARSHAL GENERAL. Harrisburg, May 12th, 1864. Circular No. 46. I. The officers of Boards of Enrollment, Western Division, Pa., are required to immediately proceed to execute the sixth section of the Act of Congress, entitled "An Act to amend an Act for enrolling and calling out the national forces, and for other purposes," approved Feb. 24, 1864.

II. They will at once appoint the necessary enrolling officers for their respective Districts, with instructions to them, that they shall be sworn in before the 20th of May, and all persons exempted under the provisions of the 2nd section of the enrolling Act, approved March 3d, 1864, but not exempted under the provisions of the Act approved Feb. 24, 1864. III. The Boards of Enrollment will also at once proceed to strike from the enrollment, upon satisfactory proof, 1. The names of all persons who have arrived at the age of forty years. 2. The names of all persons manifestly physically or mentally unfit for the service. 3. The names of such persons as are at the time, actually and legally in the military or naval service of the United States. 4. The names of such persons as have served in the military or naval service, two years or more, during the present war, and have been honorably discharged therefrom. IV. To the end that all persons interested may have notice, and the object in view (a complete and accurate revised enrollment) promoted, Dis. Pro.
