LICENSE.—For the information of many of our country friends who are in the habit of drawing instruments of writing, we will inform them that every person, other than one holding a license as a lawyer or claim agent, whose business it is to draw deeds, bonds, mortgages, wills, writs, or other legal papers or to examine titles to real estate, shall be regarded as a conveyancer and must pay a license of \$10. or in default thereof, are liable, upon conviction, to mprisonment not exceeding two years and a fine not exceeding five hundred dollars.
