COUNTY OFFICER'S FEES .- The following a copy of the Act passed at the last session of the Legislature, increasing the fees of the several county officers of this commonwealth. It will be observed that the Act is merely temporary in its provisions, and authorize he increase to be demanded during the pres ent year only:

Section 1. Be it enacted, That for one year from the passage of this Act, the Sher-ffs, Prothonotaries, Clerks of the Orphans Court, Clerks of the Court of Oyer and Ter-Clerks of the Court of Quarter Se Recorder of Deeds, and Register ills, of the counties of this Commonwealt hall be and they are hereby authorized dd to, collect and receive, twenty per cer n addition to the sum total of all fees allowers law: Provided, That this Act shall not a y to the counties of Philadelphia, and All eny, Susquehanna, Bradford, and Sulliva

CAUTION TO FENCE-BREAKERS AND THIEVES. -Among the acts passed by the last Legislare is one providing :

That if any person or persons, from and fter the passage of this act, shall malicious y and wantonly break or throw down any est and rail, or other fence, erected for the iclosure of land, or shall carry away, break r destroy any post or other material of whach fence was built, enclosing any lot field within this commonwealth, such por persons so offending, shall be guilty meanor, and on conviction shall be enced to pay a fine not exceeding fifty ars, one half thereof to be paid to the i mer, on conviction of the offender or offer the other half to the support of the poor such county, township, or borough or ward where the offense has been committed, with
