CLEAN CULTURE. Much has been said and written upon this subject, yet its importance is unappreciated by farmers generally.

In the first place, many men make a mistake in plowing the ground too early. Others do not more than half fit it for the crop.

Premising that the soil is in proper condition, the roller should immediately follow the plow; then harrow lengthwise of the furrow and next diagonally, so as not to disturb the soil.

Now, the true way is to have no arbitrary rule about it. Keep it clean and the soil mellow, if you have to keep the cultivator going until the corn is tassel'd out—and hoe it if necessary.

U.S. ARMY CLAIM AGENCY FOR THE COLLECTION OF BOUNTY, BACK PAY, PENSIONS, and other Claims against the Government. BOUNTY AND BACK PAY. To enable those who may have claims upon the United States for money due deceased officers and soldiers on account of military services rendered, while in the regular or volunteer service, we publish the following order of payment:

1st. Invalids disabled since March 4th, 1861, in the military and naval service of the United States in the line of duty. 2d. Widows of officers, soldiers, or seamen, dying of wounds received or of disease contracted in the military or naval service of the United States in the line of duty.
