FOR THE BEDFORD INQUIRER. SCHOOL REFORM NO. 2. Grading of Salaries according to Qualifications.

three, or even four times as much in the same term, as another. There are probably few callings or professions in which there is se great a difference; and yet, in many districts Directors overlook this important fact and pay old and young, scholar and ignoramus the same salary.

Two teachers are employed, perhaps in ad. joining schools, -one has taught several years and professes skill and fine scholarship,-the other is a boy or a girl fifteen or sixteen years old, teaching for the first time, and just scholar enough to get the worst certificate issued. Both, however, are paid the same salary Such instances are still common in the coun try, and directors, by this miserable policy have done the school system immense injury If they pay boys and girls as much as men and women; if they value extreme youth, bad scholarship, and total inexperience as highly as mature age, good scholarship, and long experience, they put merit at a discoun and offer a premium for ignorance. The poorly qualified teacher has no incentive to improve and the well qualified will seek em ployment in other districts or in other coun ties where they are better appreciated.

In some districts, however, a different cour is pursued and with the best results. Teachers are paid according to their qualifications. Different methods of doing this, prevail in different districts. In some districts, the best teachers are put into the most important schools and paid more than teachers of those less important. In others, a certain price pur less important. In others, a certain price per | and 10 days.

month is fixed for certificates that average 2, a smaller price for those that average 3, and so on through all the grades. Others fix a maximum price per month for No 1 certificates, that is, for certificates that add up 8, or have 1 in each of the eight branches marked at the examinations; and then deduct fifty ents per month for each unit that the certificate adds up more than 8.

Total. Practice of Teaching is not usually marked until the school is visited. The rest are marked at the examination. The above certifical to be No. 1, and draw the highest wages should to be No. 1, and draw the highest wages should add up only 8; but it adds up 20\(^3\) or 12\(^3\) more than 8. If 1 more than 8 deducts fifty cents per month from the maximum salary 12\(^3\) will deduct 12\(^3\) x50—\(^3\). 37\(^3\). If now the maxisalary be fixed at \(^3\)40 per month, the above certificate will draw \(^3\)40-6.37\(^3\)\_-33.62\(^3\). The same plan of determining what a certificate draws, can be applied, no matter what maxinum price directors agree upon.

Each of the above methods is a step in the right direction, but neither goes far enough. Practice of Teaching, considered with refer ence to a Teacher's usefulness is far more im portant than any other branch, but is not in cluded. It should be. If in addition to the deductions made above, one or two dollars per month be deducted for each unit more than 1 in the mark for Practice of Teaching: the plan will be as good, in my judgement as it can be made. If this mark in the above certificate be 2, the salary will be \$31.621; if 3, \$29.621. The plan should not, however be inexorably enforced in all cases.
