NEWSPAPER TAX EXTRAORDINARY.—The several proprietors of Printing Establishments in this place have been called upon by Deputy Assessor, Thomas Hughes, during the week and informed that by a decision of the Commissioner of Internal Revenue, under date of the 6th of November, 1865, he has decided that Printing Establishments are liable to a tax of six per cent on the gross amount of charges for work done and materials furnished, which would make the tax on this office over three hundred dollars, at the same time our gross expenses are almost equal to our gross charges.
