But it was a step in the right direction, and a first step. Before this we had few maps and little apparatus of any kind. Modern appliance for importing knowledge were almost unknown amongst us. Some schools were even without blackboards others had them, but never used them. We emember three or four of the latter sort. There hangs the blackbcards just where they have been for two years, as bright and new as he day they were made, uncratched by crayon and unsullied by chalk-dust. We need not

say the teachers of these schools were the worst kind of dunces. But to come back to the maps. We think their purchase "turns over a new leaf." The naps are bought.
