THE BEDFORD COUNTY OIL PROSPECTS. - On last Monday morning we visited the works of the Bedford County Oil Company at the Foot of Dry Ridge, and found the boring progressing very rapidly. The depth penetrated was 440 feet. We were informed that they had had three oil strikes, the principal one at 367 feet, which they supposed would yield paying quantities. The object is to test the matter fully and if funds sufficient are forthcoming, we have no doubt, that they will go to the depth of eight or nine hundred feet. The theory advanced by the operators is that they cannot tell the extent of the oil prospect until the water is pumped from the well, which may require weeks and even months of pumping before the greasy fluid can be successfully taken out, unless there should be a very heavy escape of gas, which does not occur once in a hundred strikes. We think the question, "Is there oil in Bedford county?" is fully settled by this experiment already, but we must now fathom the extent of the article, and we hope that our people will problem. Good judges are satisfied that the indications are fully as good as they are in Western Pennsylvania. Shall the matter be fully tested? Redford Inquirer. Huckstering.—The following Act of interest to the people of this county, has passed both houses of the Legislature, and is now a

AN ACT, In relation to huckstering in the counties of Bedford, Cumberland, Franklin, Fulton and York.

SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Comor barter for, within the limits of the counties of Bedford, Cumberland, Franklin, Fulton and York, with the intention to sell or dispose of to any person or persons outside of the said counties, respectively, butter, eggs, dried fruit, veal, chickens, turkeys, geese, ducks or other poultry, without first taking said counties respectively, which said license the said county treasurers are hereby author ized to grant to all applicants upon the payment of the following sums of money, to wit to persons residing within the county in which he or she or they make application agons the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars, and to persons residing without the county in which application is made for a license to huckster with one horse and wagon for such licenses with two or more horses and | Mexico. wagons the sum of two hundred dollars. Pro vided, That the treasurer granting such license shall be entitled to the sum of three dollars for each license so granted, which shall be paid by the applicant at the time of receiving said license. Prvovided further, That nothing herein contained shall prevent merchants or store-keepers from disposing of or sending to market any where any produce, marketing or poultry mentioned in this act which has been taken in at their store or place of business from persons producing the same. And provided further, That merchants or store-keepers using or employing a horse and wagon to gather up produce marketing or poultry after the manner of hucksters shall in addition to the sum they are now required by law to pay for their licenses as merchants or store-keepers pay fifty per centum of the

Section 2. Any person or persons violating any of the provisions of this act shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction thereof be sentenced to pay a fine of \$50 one-half thereof for the use of the county in which such conviction was had, and th other one-half for the use of the informer and in default of the payment of such a finsuch person or persons shall undergo an imprisonment in the county jail of such county for a period not less than twenty nor more than thirty days.
