For the sweeter fruits, strawberries, peaches, sweet pears, isackleberries, and the like, we use from 4 to 6 lbs. of sugar to the gallon of water, or ½ to 4 lb. to the pint. For more acid fruits, as cherries, plums, sour pears, currants, crab apples, etc., about 1 lb. to the pint, more or less, according to the acidity, and ripenesss. SELECTING AND PREPARING THE FRUIT. As a rule, choose fully ripe fruit, but not that over-ripe. A soft or decaying spot may in- jure the flavor, and tend to decay the whole. If too green, the flavor will be inferior. Peaches pears etc. meed paring. Some scald peaches, to aid in removing the thin skin, but they are better pared.
