Furthermore, the high mission of the Union party, as avowed in the Baltimore Conven-tion, to "extirpate slavery," includes the removal of all the hateful and anti-popular excrescences engrafted by that institution for its own selfish aggrandizement upon our for its own sensin aggrandizement upon our free national laws and polity. That high mission and obligation cannot be accomplish-ed until all which slavery has so engrafted is cut out; for until then slavery is not "ex-tirpated." Earnestly sympathizing with the men who look to a law of equal representation as the
