WHAT SORT OF ANIMAL IS THE MOST PROFITABLE FOR THE PRODUCER AND CONSUMER.

This is, undoubtedly, that animal which has the least offal and fat, and yields the largest amount of the best pieces of meat for the table, in proportion to the weight of its carcass.

The West Highland cattle of Scotland, were formerly superior to all other breeds in crops, from which part of the carcass the Porter House steak and Tender loins are cut;

Lately, considerable attention has been paid by breeders of these last three famous species of cattle, to make them equal the in West Highlanders the crops and fore ribs and great improvement has consequently been made in these desirable points;

It is because the South Down sheep so eminently excels all others in the same point, in which the Highland cattle are superior, that its carcass commands a higher price than any other.

It is a mistaken notion on the part of some to suppose that when we have lessened the offal of our domestic animals, and added a large proportion of fat, that we have done all that is necessary to perfect the carcass for the table.

U. S. INTERNAL REVENUE TAXES.

Second Division, Bedford County, 16th Collection District, Penna.

NOTICE.—The annual assessment for this district having been completed, all residents of the above Division, who have been assessed, and are liable for taxes on Carriages, Billiard Tables, Slaughtered Cattle, Manufacturers' Licenses, or any article or occupation specified in the excise law, are required to make payment at the POST OFFICE, in Bedford, on or before the 24th day of October.

PENALTIES.—All persons who fail to pay their taxes, at the date above specified will be notified by mail, and a fine of Twenty Cents will be added for each month's delay, but not more than TEN DOLLARS for each year, and a warrant will be issued for the collection of the tax and penalty.

A STRAY STEEL came to the premises of the subscriber living in St. Clair township, Bedford County, on or about the last of May, 1866, 4th, the ground shell is an inert substance, decomposing very gradually and producing no evil effects, and good ones only in case the ground lacks calcareous matter, except so far as 1 to 1 1/2 per cent. of animal matter and a trace of phosphoric acid will go. Many soils need calcareous matter, and 5 pounds of slaked oyster shell lime will go much further toward supplying this for a crop or two, than 50 of pure shells.

U. S. ARMY CLAIM AGENCY for the COLLECTION OF BOUNTY, BACK PAY, PENSIONS, and other Claims against the Government. ROONEY AND BACK PAY.

To enable those who may have claims upon the United States for moneys due deceased officers and soldiers on account of military services rendered, while in the regular or volunteer services, we publish the following order of payment:

First.—If the deceased was Married, payment will be made: 1st, to the widow; 2d, if no widow, to the child or children; 3d, to the nearest next of kin, collectively; lastly, to the heirs general, to be distributed in accordance with the laws of the State in which the deceased had his domicile.

In the number entitled to Bounty may be added the pro rata Bounty due soldiers discharged for wounds received in actual battle.

PENSIONS. Under the Act of Congress, approved July 14th, 1862, pensions are granted to the following classes of persons:

1st. Invalids disabled since March 4th, 1861, in the military and naval service of the United States in the line of duty.

2d. Widows of officers, soldiers, or seamen, dying of wounds received or of disease contracted in the military or naval service as above.

3d. Children under sixteen years of age, of such deceased persons, if their father be no widow surviving, or from the time of the widow's second marriage.

4th. Mothers (who have no husband living) of officers, soldiers, or seamen, deceased as aforesaid, provided the latter have left neither widow nor children under sixteen years of age; and provided also, that the mother was dependent, wholly or in part, upon the deceased for support.

5th. Sisters under sixteen years of age of such deceased persons, dependent on the latter, wholly or in part, for support; provided there are no right-ful claimants of either of the last preceding classes.

ATTENTION PENSIONERS! Look to Your Interest!

The Act of Congress, approved June 6th, 1866, gives additional pension to the following class of persons:

1st. To those who have lost the sight of both eyes, or both hands, or are totally disabled in the same, so as to require constant attendance, the sum of \$25.

2d. To those who have lost both feet, or are so disabled as to render them unable to perform manual labor, or are reduced to the loss of a hand or foot, the sum of \$15.

4th. Persons who have been deprived of their pension on account of being in the military or naval service of the United States, and who have been honorably discharged, and who have been restored.

5th. Invalid Pensioners who died after application for their pension, and whose families are dependent on the pension certificate, and who have left widows or minor children, will be entitled to receive arrears due at death of the soldier.

6th. Pensioners are extended to dependent fathers and brothers, the same as mothers and sisters. In all the above cases new applications must be made.
