rected with judgment, it will be found that e profits upon the outlay increase in mor hus, supposing that twenty-five dollars to be he lowest and fifty the highest sum that ca be employed in the common culture of the ame acre of land, it is more than probab that if twenty-five dollars would return at th rate of ten per cent., the fifty dollars would ield twenty per cent., or an intermediat um in the same ratio. Admitting this to be rue, and no experienced agriculturist wil loubt it, it follows that a capital of five tho and dollars expended in the cultivation two hundred acres will only yield a profit of five hundred, while if it were applied to one hundred acres it would produce one thousan dollars ; therefore it is evident that his profit would be increased by diminishing the quar tity of his land.

Many a man has been ruined by a large farm who might have acquired a competence on one with half the number of acres. Mos farmers are anxious for large plantations and many are thus betrayed into the error attempting to work a greater quantity of ground than they have the means of mi ging to advantage. Some in the delusive hope of aquiring these means by future sa vings, others from the vanity of holding move land than their neighbors ; hence arise a de deficiency of stock, imperfect tillage, and scanty crops, with all the train of rent in arrear, wages ill paid, and debts unsatisfied and final ruin.

He who prudently commences with only such a number of acres as he has power o cultivating with proper effect, is certain of raising the full return from the soil; and his engagements being in accordance with his means, he enjoys present ease of mind, and lays the surest foundation for future pros

It therefore behooves a man to weigh wel the charges with his means, and never allow himself to be seduced by any ideal prospec of gain into the impurdence of entering up a larger farm than his property will enabl him to manage with the spirit necessary t insure success. Truly did Judge Buel say that "large farms are the curse of our coun country," and perhaps no one had better ex perience from which to draw such an ex

If a farmer has one hundred acres it would be much better for him to put the price of another hundred on it than to buy one hundred more and make the same labor produce double the crops, and not have double labor for double crops as is usually the case with us .- Germantown Telegraph.

THE SWEETNESS OF FERMENTED BREAD.

The little cavities in a loaf of Bread, which gives it its spongy character, and makes it light, are formed by the expansion of little bubbles of carbonic acid gas; there are three different methods by which these little masses of carbonic acid are mingled with the

In making what is called aerated bread, the carbonic acid is obtained by any economical process, and is then mechanically mixed with the dough by agitating the two together in an air-tight vessel. On being placed in a hot oven the bubbles of gas expand, and put the dough into a spongy mass.

Soda biscuit are raised by setting free car bonic acid from bicarbonate of soda. This salt is composed of soda, carbonic acid, and water, and if it be brought in contact with tartaric acid, the soda leaves the carboni acid to combine with the tartaric, and the Advantage is taken of these affinities to distribute carbonic acid gas in minute masse through the dough. Tartaric acid is firs thoroughly incorporated with the dough, and then bicarbonate of soda is added and also thoroughly mixed with the mass. The tar trate of soda, formed by the combination o tartaric acid and soda, of course remains in the dough, and is taken into the stomach

with the bread. In fermented bread the carbonic acid is obtained from the flour. All grain contain starch, and by proper treatment starch may be converted into grape sugar, which in its turn may be changed into carbonic acid and alchohol. Both of these changes are effected by fermentation. Panic fermentation simply the growth of yeast. Yeast is a micriscopic plant, and when emerced in a proper liquid and subjected to the proper temper ature, it propagates and grows with great rapidity. When it grows in contact with moistened starch it converts the starch first into sugar, and then the sugar into carboni acid and alcohol. The sweetness of fermented bread is doubtless due to the circumstance that a portion of the sugar formed from the starch remains in the bread without being changed into carbonic acid and alcohol. -Scientific American.
