FOR THE COLLECTION OF

BOUNTY, BAK PAY, PENSIONS,

and other Claims against the Government.

Under the Act of Congress, approved July 14th,

1862, persons are granted to the following classes

of persons:

1st. Invalids disabled since March 4th, 1861, in

the military and naval service of the United States

in the line of duty.

2d. Widows of officers, soldiers, or seamen, dying

of wounds received or of disease contracted in

the military or naval service as above.

3d. Children of soldiers, or seamen, deceased,

if their father or mother is now living, or if

the father or mother is now deceased, and the

children are under sixteen years of age, such

deceased persons, if their father or mother is

now living, or if the father or mother is now

deceased, and the children are under sixteen

years of age, and the children are dependent

upon the father or mother, or upon the father
