A great majority of the mammoth corpo rations of the present day, are exercising their influence and expending their wealth, directly in or position to the best interests of the people. They step aside from their legitimate privileges and endeavor to control legislation and the ballot in such a manner as to further their mischievous and selfish ends. They oppress and burden the weak and fortify themselves by legislative enactments in the grossest wrong. They not only militate against the best interests of the citizens, but they grasp almost the reigns of Government. The interests of the State are as naught if they conflict with any one of these hydras. Under such circumstances it becomes the imperative duty of the citizen to protect himself and the State before it is too late.

There is no way that so much can be done to eradicate this great and growing evil as by passing a Free Railroad Law. There was a time when it was necessary to protect milway companies by special legislative enactments, but that day has gone by. Every man, or company of men, that desires to construct a railway for public or private purposes, should have the same privileges to do so that they would have to construct an ordinary road by complying with the law. Why should there be more restrictions thrown around railroads than any other roads? If men go into an unpaying speculation it is a matter of their own. If they desire to build a railroad, and comply with the law upon the subject, let them do manufacturing establishment, they perfect an organization under a general law, and no one endeavors to interfere with their doing so. If a general manufacturing law meets all the necessities of that great branch of human enterprise, we are quite sure that railroads can be just as successfully con-
