Destructive Fire in Johnstown!—At two o'clock on Sunday morning last occurred one of the most destructive fires that ever visited Johnstown. Some gentleman passing up Main street at that hour discovered that the hat store of George Turner, three doors from the north-east corner of Main and Franklin streets, was on fire, and at once sounded the alarm. In a few minutes several persons were on the ground, and the store-room was broken open. It was found that the flames had enveloped the counters and the goods upon the shelves, and that it was impossible even to enter the burning building. Water thrown upon the flames failed to quench them or even to stay their progress. Then the truth flashed upon the minds of the persons present that the entire row of buildings of which the hat store formed a part would probably be involved in the conflagration, and efforts were promptly made to arouse the whole town to fight the devouring element.
