Men, horses, wagons, carts and barrows were filling, grading, curbing, and guttering were done, beautiful shade trees were destroyed, steps to houses removed, lots originally high were left higher, and those before on a level with the street were now too low to be drained. Few citizens complained, for the Borough Fathers promised to improve the street so that persons living in the east end of town would not be annoyed by water. The result of all this work failed to satisfy any person, except the members of the Council and the contractors, for the water ran where it always had run, and also into houses it had never before visited. Persons owning property on the street were not satisfied, for they said they were injured, while other tax-payers complained that they had to pay money which benefitted only the contractors. Can
