JUDGE SHARSWOOD ON LEGAL TENDERS.

Extract from His Opinion in the Case Borle vs. Trott.

"On the whole, then, I am of opinion that the provision of the act of Congress of February 25th 1862, declaring the notes issued in pursuance of that act to be lawful money, and a legal tender

"This renders it unnecessary that, I should constone the other question which has been made, as to the effect of the special agreement to pay in lawful silver money of the United States. I am in favor of entering judgment for the plaintiff, but as a majority of the court are of a different opinion, judgment for the defendant."—Copied from the Philadelphia Age of 23d of February, 1864, where the opinion is published in full.
