The Supreme Court of Pennsylvania decided the act of Assembly which deprived the Pittsburgh and Connellsville Railroad Company of its Charter to be unconstitutional, and immediately upon the promulgation of this decision the Legislature of Pennsylvania, first the Senate and then the House, unanimously restored the franchises of the Company with a provision that the road must be completed in three years from the approval of the restoratory act. The repeal of the charter was one of the greatest outrages ever perpetrated by the Legislature and the Restoration was a simple act of justice.
