SENATORIAL CONFERENCE.—At 7 o'clock P. M. on Tuesday the following conferees of this Senatorial district, met at the Washington Hotel in Bedford, to elect a delegate to the Republican National Convention at Chicago.

Fulton—Col. Wm. W. Kirk. Bedford—Simon Nyeum, J. H. Longenecker, Samuel Shaffer. Somerset—Cyrus Myers, Curtis Kooser, Josiah Keller.

Two delegates from Fulton county, who were absent, had instructed Col. Kirk to act for their full delegation.

On motion of Mr. Myers, Col. Kirk was called to the chair.

On motion of Mr. Myers, J. H. Longenecker was elected Secretary.

Dr. S. E. Duffield had instructed the delegates from Fulton to withdraw his name as a candidate for delegate to the Chicago Convention.

The following resolutions were then read, and on motion adopted.

Resolved, That Hon. John Ceresa be and he is hereby, unanimously elected as one of the Delegates from this Congressional District to the Chicago Convention to nominate candidates to be supported by the Republican party, for the offices of President and Vice President of the United States. Said delegates to have the right of substitution.

Resolved, That the Delegates from this District to the State Convention be requested to use their best efforts to secure for Dr. S. E. Duffield, of Fulton county, a place on the national ticket of the Republican party of Pennsylvania.

Resolved, That we rejoice at the firm and united stand taken by the Republican members of Congress in regard to the crimes of the acting President of the United States, and confidently hope that the time is near at hand, when the country will be rid of that scoundrel and tyrant, made Executive by the "vilest crime of the age, and attempting to act also as the legislative and judiciary departments of the government by the commission of crimes, little less in enormity than the greatest which for the time being, made him the Executive head of the nation.

RAILROAD MEETING.—In pursuance of a call published in the Gazette and Inquirer last week, the people of Bedford county assembled in mass meeting in the Court House, on Monday afternoon, the 24th inst.

On motion of J. R. Durbin the meeting was organized by placing the Honorable ALEXANDER KING, President Judge of the 16th Judicial District, in the chair, and the appointment of Hon. GEORGE W. GUMR, and JOHN MOWEN, Esq., as Vice Presidents, and John Lutz and John P. Reed, Esquires, Secretaries.

The following gentlemen were appointed a Committee on Resolutions: Wm. M. Hall, John W. Lingenfelter, and Geo. H. Spang, Esquires.

The Chairman of the above committee read the following resolutions:

1. The people of Bedford County, in mass meeting, hereby express their gratification at the decision of the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania, pronouncing the act of Assembly repealing the charter of the Pittsburgh & Conneville Railroad null and void, and hail with joy the prospect of the completion, at an early date, of a Grand Through Road from Pittsburgh to Baltimore, which will pass within twenty miles of Bedford, and open up to commerce, mining and manufactures the south-western portion of our county.

2. That whilst we regret the fact that the Southern Pennsylvania Railroad seems to have been a mere occupation of the ground, with a short connection, and with no apparent intention of making a road, yet we do not agree with the views of John Edgar Thompson, President of the Penn. Central Road, lately expressed in his report to the stockholders, that it is not practicable to make any great through railroad traversing Southern Pennsylvania, and we hope that Philadelphia enterprise and capital will ultimately build an independent Southern Pennsylvania through railroad.

3. That Bedford being 30 miles nearer, via Wills Creek, to Baltimore, than via Huntingdon to Philadelphia, and sixty miles nearer, via same route, to Pittsburgh than via Huntingdon, our natural line of connection, as between these routes is with the Conneville Road at Bridgeport, and we urge upon our citizens to be prepared to aid such an enterprise with their good will and money.

4. That the time from Bedford to Wills Creek, being nearly straight, of easy grade, with no deep cuts or expensive bridges, the road can be made at such small expense as to be within the reach of accomplishment by a united effort as soon as the Conneville road is put under contract.

5. That the Chairman appoint a committee of ten citizens to procure the passage of an act of Assembly chartering the Bedford and Bridgeport Railroad Company, and to take such steps as may be deemed wise to inform the public of the advantages of this railroad connection, and to place the project in course of accomplishment.

6. That we approve the course of our members, J. T. Richards and John Weller, in favor of a fair Free Railroad Law, and that we endorse the House bill as such, and request our Senator, Hon. Alex. Stutzman, to vote for said House bill.

Pending the resolutions, speeches were made by Wm. M. Hall, Esq., William Hartley, Esq., and Hon. Judge King. The resolutions were unanimously adopted.

Subsequently Mr. Hartley offered several resolutions pertaining to the Southern Pennsylvania and Conneville railroad, which after some discussion were withdrawn.

The Chairman appointed the following committee in accordance with the above resolutions: Wm. M. Hall, William Hartley, J. R. Durbin, George W. Gumm, J. W. Lingenfelter, John Mann, John Aldip, and Jno. Ceresa.

On motion a committee of three were appointed to visit Harrisburg and urge the passage of the House Free Railroad bill, consisting of Hon. Jno. Ceresa, B. F. Meyers and D. W. Washburn, Esqs.

On motion adjourned.

LOCAL LEGISLATION.—We give below the message of Gov. Geary, vetoing a Senate bill purporting to be for the "relief of James Clark," in the matter of the building of the bridge across the Raysdown Branch of the Juniata, at this place. The message explains itself.

EXECUTIVE CHAMBER, HARRISBURG, Feb. 24th, 1868.

To the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania: I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of Senate Bill No. 50, entitled "An Act for the relief of James Clark," which is hereby returned with my objections.

This bill is not in conformity with the 8th section of the constitution of the State, which declares that "No bill shall be passed by the legislature containing more than one subject, which shall be clearly expressed in the title."

The first section is for the relief of James Clark; but the second section provides that a certain bridge shall be declared a county bridge, and hereafter maintained as such. This is an entirely different subject, and there is no reference to it whatever in the title of the bill.

So far as relates to the merits of the first section, the main facts in the case appear to be these: The Bedford and Hollidaysburg Turnpike Board Company needed a bridge over the Raysdown Branch of the Juniata in 1830, contracted with one John Arnold to build it. Arnold employed James Clark to erect the bridge, by a written contract dated in Sept. 1839, under which Clark built the bridge. The company subsequently became insolvent, and forfeited its charter. It is now alleged that Clark was never paid for the bridge, and that he has, nearly thirty years afterwards, proposed to authorize him to enforce the collection of his claim against the County Commissioners of Bedford county.

However good this claim may have been at one time, against the parties to the contract, its great age does not recommend it to favor.

But the legislature has no power to make one man pay the debts of another, and this general principle applies to counties, and other corporations, as well as to individuals.

Holding these views on the questions involved in the bill, I am constrained to return it without my approval.

He was followed to the tomb by his many relatives and friends sad and sorrowful that one, who had ever manifested the finest business and social qualifications, should be cut off in the prime of life when he might have had the full destroyer spared him, lived years of usefulness and a blessing to the circle in which he moved. He was committed to the tomb according to the ceremonies of the Ancient order of Masons of Portage Lodge, Hollidaysburg, of which he had for a long time been a member. Mr. Barnholler conducted business for many years at Martinsburg and Woodbury and filled a position in the community which could not well be filled by another. For several years he had retired from active business operations and was, at the time of his death, making arrangements to remove to Hopewell, where he intended to commence business again, but death overtook him and he is gone to that "hourne from which no traveler returns."
