THE EIGHT HOUR LAW.—The following is the eight hour law passed at the late session of the Legislature.

Section 1. That on and after the first day of July, 1888, eight hours of labor between the rising and setting of the sun, shall be deemed and held to be a legal day's work in all cases of labor and service by men, women and children.

Section 2. This act shall not apply to, or in any way affect, farm or agricultural labor or service by the year, month or week; nor shall any person be prevented by anything herein contained, from working as many hours over, or extra work as he or she may see fit, the compensation to be agreed upon between the employer and employee.

Section 3. All other acts or parts of acts relating to the hours of labor which shall conflict with a day's work in this act or repealed.
