I find a paragraph in the Chicago papers, credited to the Commercial of the 2d instant asserting that the conference in New York, between certain of the managers of the Pennsylvania Railroad Company and the Pittsburgh, Fort Wayne and Chicago Railway Company, had resulted in an arrangement to consolidate the two roads, and that the contract was in preparation and would be signed by both parties by the middle of this month.
