REPORTS OF COMMITTEES.

Mr. TRUMBULL, from the Committee on the Judiciary, reported in favor of the indefiniteness of the joint resolution...

Mr. WILLIAMS introduced a bill to provide for the better administration of justice in the Territories of the United States...

Mr. ABBOTT introduced a bill to provide for the payment of claims of loyal citizens of the State lately in rebellion...

Mr. SHERMAN introduced a bill to repeal the act providing for the admission of Georgia to representation in Congress...

At 12:15 P. M., on motion of Sherman, the Senate went into Executive session...

Mr. CHANDLER asked to take up the bill relative to the duties on copper wire...

Mr. SHERMAN said the Finance Committee had not intended to report this bill until after the holidays...

Mr. CHANDLER then said he would call the bill up to-morrow.

On motion of Mr. WARNER, the Judiciary Committee was instructed to inquire whether the bills to remove political disabilities...

Mr. SUMNER called up the joint resolution tendering the thanks of the United States to the people of Spain.

At 1 P. M. a message was received from the House concerning the resolutions on the death of Mr. Stevens...

Mr. CAMERON took the floor and read an eulogy on the life, character and public services of the deceased.

Mr. BACKLICK then submitted the usual resolutions of respect.

Mr. CAMERON then drew a comparison between Benjamin Franklin and Thaddeus Stevens...

Mr. MORRILL, of Vermont, and Mr. SUMNER followed.

The resolutions were then adopted and the Senate adjourned.

Mr. WILSON, of Iowa, offered a resolution directing the Secretary of War to prepare a report on the expediency of appointing a commission...

Mr. STARKWELL, of Connecticut, offered a resolution directing the Committee on Commerce to report on the expediency of legislation necessary to protect fur seals in Alaska...

Mr. CHURCHILL, of New York, introduced a bill to regulate the taking of testimony in United States courts...

Also, a bill to regulate peremptory challenges in the Courts of the United States.

Mr. SEBENK, of Ohio, offered a resolution calling for a report on the expediency of legislation necessary to protect fur seals in Alaska...

Mr. WALKER, of New York, asked to present the report of the Committee on Retrenchment for the purpose of having it printed and reprinted. Agreed to.

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Mr. MAYNARD, of Tennessee, demanded the regular order, which the speaker said was reports of a private nature from committees.

Mr. JILLIAN, of Indiana, from the Committee on Public Lands, reported a bill granting the privileges of the Homestead Law to children of soldiers...

Mr. FERRY, of Michigan, from the Committee on Post Offices and Post Roads, reported several private bills, pending the consideration of which it was ascertained there was no quorum present.

The Speaker announced that he had selected E. B. Washburne to act as Speaker on Monday, when he (Mr. Colfax) would be absent.

Mr. POTTIS, of Pennsylvania, announced the death of his predecessor, Darwin A. Finny, and pronounced an eulogy on his life and character.

He was followed by Messrs. O'Neil, Randall and Woodward, of Pennsylvania, after which the House adjourned until Monday.
