AN ACT to incorporate the Citizens' Cooperative Mutual Life Insurance Company of Bedford, Pennsylvania.

Section 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, that the following be and the same be the charter of the Citizens' Cooperative Mutual Life Insurance Company of Bedford, Pennsylvania.

Section 2. Any person under the age of twenty-one years may become a member of the said association, under the laws of the State of Pennsylvania.

Section 3. The corporation aforesaid shall have the power to appoint a president, vice president, secretary and treasurer, or such other officers as may be required to carry out the objects of said corporation.

Section 5. The corporation aforesaid shall have the power to make, execute, issue, and pay bonds, notes, and other negotiable instruments.

Section 6. The corporation aforesaid shall have the power to sue and be sued, to plead, defend, and otherwise prosecute and defend its business.

Section 7. The corporation aforesaid shall have the power to make, execute, issue, and pay bonds, notes, and other negotiable instruments.
