FROST CRYSTALS UPON DRIED GRASS.—
Several persons have by this time laid up to put into bouquets the beautiful grasses which they gathered in the autumn and summer of the present year. In order to add variety and some pleasing effects to portions of such grasses, they may be covered with imitation frost-crystals, some white, others blue-green, and amber. To crystallize dry grass white, steep it in a solution of one plut of hot water containing one pound of alum. As it becomes cold, crystals will adhere to the grass, which will increase in size if left for a day or more; but small crystals leak the best and in order to keen them.
