OUR FINANCIAL PROSPECT.

There are many people, who have a natural inclination to look for the dark side of everything. They belong to the same class that are continually lamenting the present and praising the good old times. Thes morbid croakers have, ever since the war been predicting a general financial crash until not only they themselves think it mus and will come but have persuaded many others to fear it. There has seldom been less reason to fear any general financial crash than at the present time. All prediction of this kind have signally failed of realization. The best informed financial journals predict now, a year of unusual busines prosperity. The currency has been cor tracted quite as much as is necessary, and there is very little probability that any further contraction will be attempted. Prices have been steadily declining until they have very nearly reached a point consistent with the volume of currency and the demand for labor. But with all this the prophets of evil have had no great crash to record. Business goes on, railroads are built, great business enterprises are projected and suc cessfully earried out, our manufactures steadily increase, our people are prospere and peace and plenty bless the whole land. The business failures, omitting those of the stock and gold gamblers in the September panic, have been less in 1869 than those of 1868 while those of 1868 were less than those of 1867, thus showing a steady improvement, than which there is no better evidence of general prosperity. Such is the general state of the country, that unless the urrency and tariff are materially changed by the present session of Congress, of which there is very little probability, the prospect is that the year upon which we have just entered will be one of prosperity and that the long looked for financial crash feared by many, will not come at all.

Silvain Salnave, who was executed at Port-au-Prince on the 10th inst., was a native of the city of Cape Hayrien, where he was born in the year 1832. He entered the army as a common solder, and gradually rose to the position of Captain of Cavalry of the North, which position he retained after the establishment of the Empire under Sculouque, although he held republican principles. When on the morning of Dec. 22, 1858, Geffard raised, in the name of the people, the standard of revolt, and declared for a Republic, the Imperial Guard were at once mustered to quell what was deemed a mad enterprise. Owing to the influence of Salnave the whole North vallied to the cause of Geffard, and finally the Empire was overthrown and a Republic established. Geffrard, being a vain, ambitious man, used little discretion in rewarding those who sepoused his cause, and, among others, conferred the position and title of Major in the army upon Salnave, to whose bravery, energy, and persistency, he actually owed his high position. Soon there came another call for his services. Spain, having taken advantage of the civil war in this country, sent a strong force, and declared the annexation of the Dominican portion of the island, and reestablished it once more as a colony. Salnave entered warmly into the conflict against the invaders, and to his efferts, more than any one person, was due the credit of their expulsion. Feeling aggrieved by the action of President Geffard flying from the country in March, 1867, and Salnave being proclaimed President. The Republic continued in a disturbed condition, and in November last, insurgents in the Sachion as well as plainer and more moderate of the service and sizes.

Capture and Execution of President Salnave.

New York January 25th.

By the arrival at this port yesterday of the schooper Setigawa, in 10 days from Aux Cayes, we are in receipt of Haytian advices to the 15th inst. The day before that on which the Setagawa left Aux Cayes in telligence was received there from Port au Prince that on Thursday, the 23th inst. Salnave was captured, with 150 of his followers, in the mountains between Aquin and Jaemel, about 30 miles from Port au Prince. The ex-President was immediately taken to the capital, and lodged in prison. It was reported at Aux Cayes that he would be forthwith put on his trial, and it was believed he would be shot.

CHARLESTON, January 26.—The French sloop of-war Timier, six days from Port au. Prince, arrived to-day, and reports that Salnave was sentenced to death and shot on the 10th inst.
