GOVERNMENT SALES OF GOLD. -- The Secretary of the Treasury has directed the Assistant Treasurer at New York to con-tinue the sale of \$1 000.000 in gold, and the purchase of \$1,000 000 in bonds, during al-ternate weeks, throughout the month of March, on account of the sinking fund, so that at least \$2,000,000 of gold will be dis-posed of next month. He has also ordered the purchase of \$1.000.000 of bonds in each alternate week of March for speculation.
