THE TEMPERANCE BILL.

THE following is the text of the bill introduced before the Legislature of Pennsylvania on the 10th inst. by Mr. Strickland.

AND WHEREAS, It is represented that a majority of the legal voters of certain counties in said district, except for medicinal purposes, as provided for in this act, shall not be allowed to sell or give away intoxicating liquors.

SECTION 2. That the courts of quarter sessions of the several counties of this Commonwealth, upon petition of at least one-fourth of the number of the legal voters of any district in this Commonwealth, as determined by the number of votes at the last general election held in that district.
