DEPARTMENT OF STATE, \ WASHINGTON, July II, 1881. SIR,-Excuse me for expressing sur prise that you ask me whether I approve of the call of a proposed National Union Convention at Philadelphia.

After more than five years of dislocation by civil war, I regard a restoration of the unity of the country as its most immediate as well as its most vital interest.
