His only offence has been that he desired a fair registration and a fair election under the reconstruction laws passed by Congress. It is not pretended that he opposed any resistance to the execution of any military order issued by General Sheridan or under his authority, although several of those orders were harsh and arbitrary, if not unlawful; nor was he guilty of disrespect on any occasion to the military power. But he forwarded to the President copies of the military rules for registration above mentioned, and a copy of an order in relation to selecting jurors in the Courts, and called attention to their character. The transmission of information to the President is thus made an offence punishable by deprivation of office, and a man rejected by the people upon a fair vote is put over them as their Governor by military power!

To show the outrageous character of us, it is only necessary to mention some of the persons excluded from enumera tion by the boards under the rules furnished them. It is to be remembered that the persons so excluded from registration are thereby disqualified to vote or to serve upon juries in the Courts of the State. We quote from the official paper furnished the Boards of Registration and by which they were guided in their work: 'Memoranda of Disqualifications,

A TALK, WITH PRESIDENT JOHNSON.

WHY HE SUPERSEDED STANTON, AND HIS REASONS FOR REMOVING SHERI-

FROM THE WASHINGTON CORRESPONDENCE OF THE HOSTON POST. In a pleasant conversation of some

length with President Johnson, I remarked that he was charged with having removed Mr. Stanton in order to obstruct the execution of the Reconstruction acts of Congress.

He asked what Mr. Stanton had to do with the execution or non-execution of these acts? These acts centred the pow er in the hands of General Grant, he had placed Grant over the War Department. He could not understand low the change could be construed into a purpose to defeat the proper execution of the reconstruction laws. The Presi dent further remarked that at one time General Grant strongly intimated that unless Mr. Stanton was removed be should be compelled to leave here, as he could be of no possible use in view of Mr. Stanton's overbearing and dictato rial conduct. The President advised him to have a talk with the Secretary of War, and perhaps they would understand each other better. He agreed, however, with the General, that Mr. Stanton ought to be removed, and be then inquired of General Grant if he would take charge of the Department in in the event of a change. The latter promp.ly expressed his entire willingness to do so.

I referred to the rumor that the Gene ral had eventually protested against the removal, and the President frankly aid such was the case; that the General had written him a very kind, but carnest, private note, in which he had in timated his fears of unarchy, if not revolution, should Secretary Stanton be superseded. Yet as he could not appre ciate the General's fears on this score

I then told him that the same charge was made against him for removing General Sheridan, and many supposes his purpose was to prevent a due execu-

And I call upon all good and well-disposed citizens of the United States to remember that upon the said Constitution and laws, and upon the judgments, decrees and process of the Courts, made in accordance with the same depend the protection of the lives, liberty, property and happiness of the people. And I exhort them, everywhere, to testify their devotion to their country, their pelde in its prosperity and greatness, and their determination to uphold its free institutions by a hearty co-operation in U-efforts of the Government to sustain he authority of the law, maintain the supremacy of the Federal Constitution, and to preserve

al Union.
