THE official returns from the several counties are sent to the Secretary of the Commonwealth, and by him opened and read in the Hall of the House of Representatives in the presence of the Governor and such of the citizens as may see proper to attend, on Tuesday, November 5. The result being ascertained, the Governor issues his proclamation declaring who has been elected, and soon after gives him his commission as Judge of the Supreme Court for a term of fifteen years from and after the first Monday of December next.

WHILE our county has done nobly, going even beyond our most sanguine expectations, all of us know that had our men turned out fully, our majority would have reached two thousand. We cannot understand why our friends should fail to vote when such important issues are at stake.
