The latter left him at the bridge over Green Creek, near Vance's, from which point the road ascends the hill along a steep bluff. The old man, not reaching home the following day, his family became alarmed, and sent to Orangeville for information. Learning that he had left town the night before, they looked at the bottom of the ledge below Bowman's mill, where he was found dead among the bushes, one arm clasping them, and the other on his breast. A severe contusion was found on his temple, which, undoubtedly caused his death. He was, at least, the finest found. He leaves a large family, and a numerous circle of friends.
