The Registry Law. We commend the following to the tax-payers of the county as exhibiting some of the workings of the new Registry Law.

Under the old law the election expenses of the county have averaged about \$400 00.

Under the Registry Law, there are four officers to district, sitting five days each, three of them at \$1.50 per day; and the Assessor \$1.00 per day—making in the 25 districts of the county, 687 50.

At the instance of any five citizens of any five counties, the Court appoints two Commissioners to superintend the elections with the election Board, at \$1.00 per day; 25 districts with two Commissioners, 50 in all, 75 00.

The Assessors are required to make a new assessment, and to perform additional duties which will take at least five days each, at \$1.00 per day each, 125 00.

This amount, which will be increased by the extra labor necessary in printing the lists, cost of books, &c., will probably reach 1,600 00.

It will be borne in mind that this sum of \$1,600 is additional to the \$400 of election expenses, as the Registry Board is entirely distinct and separate from the Election Board.

Meeting of the Pennsylvania Association.

THE Third Annual Meeting of this body took place on Saturday, May 29th at Pittsburgh, it being the anniversary of the last fight of the Corps at Bethesda Church, Va.

At 11.40 A. M. the Association was called to order by its President, Ex-Gov. Curtin, who, in a few brief words thanked the members for the honor of a re-election during his absence in Europe.

The Secretary, Maj. Harvey, then read the minutes of the last Association, which were adopted. The next business was the election of a Board of Directors, each Regiment having authority to elect three members.

The new Board of Directors then withdrew, and elected the following officers for the ensuing year. President—Hon. A. G. Curtin. Vice President—Gen. Wm. McCandless.

Corresponding Secretary—Col. John H. Tugart. Recording Secretary—Maj. John C. Harvey. Treasurer—Col. John P. Taylor.

The Association then adjourned to meet again at two o'clock in the afternoon. AFTERNOON SESSION. The Association was called to order at two o'clock.

Governor Curtin proposed "the healths of Major General Ord," and Meade which was greeted with three cheers.

Governor Curtin made an appropriate and feeling closing address, and the Association adjourned after singing in chorus "Auld Lang Syne."

The meeting was a pleasant one, and not a single event occurred to mar its harmony. Political allusions were carefully excluded, and from this fact we predict the future success of the Association.
