FIRE.—On last Tuesday night, a heavy storm set in about nine o'clock accompanied by thunder and lightning. About half past eleven o'clock a clap of thunder, followed by the discharge of a park of artillery, awakened our citizens, and soon after the terrible cry of "Fire! Fire!" was raised. The lightning had struck the stable of Dr. J. H. McKelvey, and when we reached the ground, it was enveloped in flames. Our citizens, as usual, were on hand, but could do but little besides preventing the adjoining buildings from catching on fire. The horses, carriages, and we believe a portion of the harness was saved. But other engines were out, but we are informed the large one did not get to work on account of the scarcity of water. The "boys" worked the "Rescue" with a will, and it did good service. The rain, however, and the absence of wind, saved us from a more general conflagration.
