PENNSYLVANIA STATE FAIR.—The Penna. State Fair will be held at Harrisburg commencing September 20th, 1898, and will continue four days. It promises to be one of the largest ever held in the State. The locality is very central, and accessible from all parts of the State by railroads. We are informed by the Secretary that already many inquiries are being made by exhibitors of their articles. The grounds contain sixty acres and are located on the banks of the Susquehanna, within a convenient distance of the city of Harrisburg, and about one half mile from the line of the Pennsylvania Railroad. The locality should insure a large and most interesting fair.

THE TOPOGRAPHY AND OLD HARBOUR. TUESDAY, May 31st, Berdan's sharpshooters crossed the Topography and gained the opposite crest, which was afterwards held by Birney's Division. We had continual fighting throughout the day, with varying success. Our shells fired some buildings in which the enemy had taken refuge; and every time they advanced, the artillery alone succeeded in repulsing them. A large brick house by our side was an especial target for them. It was occupied by some ladies, who refused to leave on account of their mother's illness. Their brother commanded the rebel battery opposite, and he tried to lay the house in ruins to prevent us from occupying it. While our guns were engaged, a negro woman, who was cooking for our men, threw some hot coals into the yard, one of which reached a timber chest, exploding it, and killing and wounding a number of soldiers, besides mauling the woman so horribly that she shortly afterwards died. The rebels gave a tremendous shout on hearing the explosion, supposing their shot had done the work.

As soon as it became dark, I was ordered to take 100 men, and go to the front as far as I could, and throw up redoubts for our guns. We soon reached the picket line, and found ourselves but 200 yards from the enemy, and could plainly hear their conversation; but interesting as it was, we had more important business to transact than to stop and listen. By tearing down a house we secured material for our work, but after laboring for some time, were started by an *abide camp* riding up and exclaiming hurriedly, "leave here as soon as possible; the infantry have been withdrawn, and the Johnnies may gobble you up any moment." Having taken the sweets of Libby prison, I took his advice, and hurried my men away with more haste than dignity.

At this time the Pennsylvania Reserve Corps left us, having served three years. Of the 15,000 men who started in that command, not 1500 returned. Their shattered ranks proved how noble they had fought; and unlike too many other organizations, they did not become cowards as the time of their discharge approached. Their last day's fight was their best; and they left us amidst universal regret, having covered themselves with glory, and having reflected honor upon the State which gave them birth. Their name and fame have gone into history, and it is my duty to give them a fitting notice in the "Pennsylvania Reserves."

II.) being curious to hear a preacher from the wilds of America, attended on one occasion, when he was so much struck by his eloquence, and he afterwards sent him a horse, which he astonished loud enough to be heard halfway over the house. Davies observing that the King was treating more attention than himself, paused, and looking his Majesty full in the face, in an emphatic tone gave him the following rebuke: "When the lion roareth, let the beasts of the forest tremble; and when the Lord speaketh, let the kings of earth keep silence." The King shrunk back in his seat, and kept quiet during the remainder of his life.

Within the sound of our guns, was the place where that grand apostle of American liberty, Patrick Henry was born. Near us were the ruins of the old Hanover Court House, built out of imported brick, and in which he made his first speech, the well known "Pardon's speech." I will mention but one other spot of historical interest, and that is the "White House," situated on the banks of the Pamunkey. It stands on the site of one in which Washington first met Mrs. Martha Custis, then "a young lady widow" stopping with Mr. Chamberlayne. He soon finished his courtship, and was married on the very grounds where his descendants were now fighting us!

On Thursday, the 2nd, we marched by Cold Harbor—a locality without name—into other points of historical interest. The usual *debata* of the camps still lay upon the ground; and the men eagerly pointed out to each other the familiar spots they encountered, and related stories and anecdotes connected with this or that locality. The Corps was placed on the extreme left, with Birney's Division in reserve. The skirmishing in front was heavy, and proved that the spirit of the enemy had not been broken by the late battles, nor was there any appearance of demoralization in their ranks. There was some heavy fighting in front of the Sixth Corps, during which Rickett's Division charged and captured 400 prisoners. As this Division had been so perfectly defeated in the Valley of Virginia, under Hunter, Schenck, Milroy, Miles, and others their conduct here elevated them in the estimation of their comrades.

During the next day Birney's Division was placed on the left of the "Baldy" Smith, commanding the Eighteenth Corps, being short of artillery, borrowed our Battery and placed us on his line, within 600 yards of the enemy's guns and sharpshooters, bringing down upon us their concentrated fire. By a

happy calculation we at once got their range, and by uninterrupted firing silenced their guns. Our shells and solid shot ploughed their works in all directions; but they continually used the spade, and built up as fast as we could destroy. About dark they made a charge in our front, which was easily repulsed; but the terrific fighting on our left showed it to be the real point of attack. For half an hour the roar of artillery and musketry was terrific, and the whole horizon was luminous with the flash of guns. The darkness for a while kept us in suspense as to the result on the left, where Hill's Corps had charged Hancock; but soon a cheer from our men that was heard for miles told us of the enemy's repulse. No-wise disheartened, they in return gave us one of their peculiar yells. Results were made at other points, but failed in no advantage to either party.

The succeeding day was but a repetition of the first; each party strengthening their works, planting *abatis*, &c. Heretofore the mortar practice had all been on our side, but the enemy now retaliated with a vengeance. We could not see their mortars, hence could not fire at them, but at one o'clock heavy bomb shells to shelter us from the mortar practice. Their range was marvellously accurate, and they not only did much damage among the men in line of battle, but caused the reserves, wagon and ammunition trains, hospitals, &c., to be moved a long distance to the rear. Every person from general to drummer-boy furrowed into the earth, and the Army of the Potomac was literally leveled.

We afterwards learned that important business to transact than to stop and listen.
