Other buildings we will refer to again, as our space permits. It is but little over fifty years since the first discoveries upon this subject were announced to the public. It is one of the youngest of those branches of learning which will, in a very short time, come to be considered a part of the necessary education of every man. I am disposed to think the time near at hand, when High Schools and Colleges, in connection with Physiology and the natural sciences, give a place to Phrenology; and that a man's success in life will be very materially secured, by following that business or profession for which it is thus found he is more specially fitted.

The merit of discovering and developing the principles of this Science, belongs to Dr. Gall of Vienna. His attention was first called to the subject by a uniform connection between full and prominent eyes, and a talent for committing to memory.—This led him to investigate the subject still further, and to look for signs of other mental characteristics, in different conformations of the head.

In the first place, only the most striking peculiarities were observed, and the similarity in the shape of the head noted. It is believed of him, that in order to locate the organ of reason, he adopted the following expedient:—He would go out into the streets and collect a crowd of boys, take them to his room, and ascertain from them which were courageous and which were cowardly; and putting each by itself, proceeded to examine and compare the respective developments on different portions of their heads. Thus, he discovered, that notwithstanding the very great diversity of shape to their heads, yet all the courageous boys displayed a *full and bilobed* just behind the top of the ears, and that the heads of all the cowardly boys were thin and depressed in that particular region.

It was some time about the year 1800 that Dr. Gall began publishing his discoveries on this new and interesting subject; and they immediately attracted a great deal of attention. Dr. Spurzheim came to Vienna about the year 1820, and becoming acquainted with Dr. Gall, adopted his views and entered heartily into the investigations of this new science. Having pursued their studies together in Vienna, they left that city in company, in 1825, in order to test their observations and to promulgate their doctrines; they studied carefully the anatomy and physiology of the nervous system, investigated every fact which had any bearing upon, or connection with their favorite theory, content to leave nothing undone, which could in any way illustrate or strengthen the system they were laboring to establish.

Thus making their observations with great care, and publishing results very cautiously, they went from Vienna to Berlin, and thence to Paris where they arrived in the fall of 1827. In this way they visited all the principal cities of the continent, in connection with each other, until 1837; when they separated in consequence of some slight disagreement in their view upon certain points. By this time however, they had pretty well developed and established their system.—It was discussed and examined, it had awakened curiosity and attention, and the learned men of the age were investigating its claims to the name and dignity of a science.
