THE word "Advent," means the 'apits publication being announced to be proach,' or 'coming'—and is a term ap"for the information of Republicans plied by the Christian Church to certain weeks before Christmas. The Eastern church does not celebrate this season by the name of Advent; but as a preparation for Christmas, they observe a senson of humiliation and prayer, comprising Forty Days. In the Romish, the English, and the American branches of the Catholic church, the Advent season s only four weeks.

As early as the time of St. Jerome who died, A. D., 520, there were collects epistles and gospels, for five Sundays before the nativity of our Lord. The Synod of Lerida, in 524, interdicted marriages between Advent and Chrise mas. In about the seventh century, and very early in it, the season came to be known by the name of Advent; and i now so observed by all Catnotic chure .

According to the arrangement of our Prayer Book, in which too the Englist. and Romish agree, the Eclesiastical o Christian year, begins with the fir-Tuesday in Advent; when we are be ginning with supplication and prayer o prepare for the coming of Chriswhose life and sufferings, and death, w continue to commemorate throughou he remainder of the year. The rule by which Advent is deter

nined defines the first Sunday, as the which comes nearest, whether before a after, to Saint Andrew's Day. Now Saint Andrew's Day is always the isday of November. Consequently the irst Sunday which comes at er the 26: s Advent. Therefore, November 27 s the earliest, and December 3rd to atest day upon which Advent Sunda can come. This year it was the 29th o November.

#### The Iron-Clad Oath.

Currey Justice Currey seems inclin ed to dispense with what is called the "iron-clad onth" as a test for grand jur ors, on the ground that it rather hinder than helps the ends of justice.

The oath is to the effect that the per son who takes it has never voluntarily given any aid or comfort of any kin to any parties engaged in rebellio against the United States; and the lay authorizes the Chief Justice to dispens with it in his discretion. Judge Chasfinds that so many men, who are bes fitted to serve as jurors, have scrupte about taking this oath that the ends justice are hindered and defeated, rath er than promoted, by requiring it is every case. Unless, therefore, some special occasion arises to require it, the Judge decides that it need not be ad ministered, and directs another jury to

be summoned in the usual way. The general judgment of the publi is the harbinger of peace.
