Gradually his theory prevailed, and many measures founded upon it have been passed and executed. He lived long enough to see his theory accepted and his policy triumphant. In his own party doubters had become resolved, the timid emboldened, the refractory subdued, and all opposition intimidated or silenced. His passions and his will had their complete gratification, except in the two important particulars of confiscation and impeachment. From all this it will appear that he died at a fit time to be canonized as a great and successful leader of party.

Mr. President, for what will men care foremember Mr.Stevens? He will be remembered for his wit and humor. which were genuine and constant; suited to onliven a dull debate or a tedious trial; to charm a social circle or an occasional companion.

He will be remembered as a lawyer, able, eloquent, and careful ; fit for the rough work of a nisi prius trial or for grave debate in a court of error. Men of the legal profession will hold in memory one who adorned that profesion and won its triumphs.

He will be remembered for some generous acts to persons in misfortune; orat though both have been united in acts magnanimous and noble, which he did not publish abroad, but which have transpired through the gratitude and seen? Why, the strength of the party admiration of others.

He will be remembered as a parliamentary leader; as the man who, heflugnee only with his life.

In clearing the grate in the morning there is a quantity of unburned coal, which has been externally subjected to combustion. It is covered with ash. and looks like cinder. It is often dumped into the ash box. The fact is that the lump is only roasted on the outside, not even cooked, and is in a better con dition for igniting than the green coal. Never waste it. Attention to these few hints will save many dollars in a winter.-Sunbury Gazette.
