> Fitz-Greene Halleck was born July 8 1790, in Guilford, Conn., and is descen ded on his mother's side, from the celebrated Rev. John Eliot, the Apostle to the Indians. In May, 1811, Halleck went to New York. He secured a situation with Jacob Barker, a leading banker and merchant. Mr. Barker having failed, Halleck went into business as a commission merchant on his own account, and himself failed, because of the destruction of trade by the war of 1812; and he returned to the countingiouse of Jacob Barker, where he renained, in all about eighteen years .-About four years after leaving Mr. Barker, to wit, in 1832, Halleck entered the counting-house of John Jacob Astor, where he continued for about seventeen years, retiring in the spring of 1849. He returned to Guilford, his native place, and took up his residence with his sister. He was never married, and seems never to have been sincerely in love,
