The Peach is an exotic and requires judicious handling and care in order that good results may be secured from its cultivation. In the early settlement of the country and for some time afterwards, when the soil was unexhaustedfull of rich mineral elements and vegctable matter-the Peach was much more healthy and fruitful than it is now. It grew with little care, produced abundant crops, and was long-lived. in recent years, however, it is compara tively feeble, short-lived and unfruitful It very commonly has the curl in the spring, is scourged by the borer, and is subject to a destructive and incurable disease, widely extended, known as the yellows. It cannot, ordinarily, be grown with success on low grounds and is often killed or checked in growth and vigor by severe winters. This constitutes the chapter of cylls which we are to confront and study in the treatment of the

Peach. Now for remedial measures and improved management, by which this princely fruit may be produced in abundance and secured for common use. We will state our recommendations (based on good authorities and observation ) in due order and as briefly as


