STRAWBERRY SHORT-CAKE.—Take one quart of sifted flour and make into laking powder biscuit, making very short, and use four teaspoons of laking powder; roll out in a large cake one inch thick, and put in a pan and bake; have ready one quart of strawberries, mashed with sugar to make them sweet, and a tea-cup of sweet cream; mix sugar, berries and cream well, and when the cake is done cut it in the center, or split it, and lay the prepared berries on one-half, covering with the other. This must be eaten while warm; you will find it delicious. Other berries can be used the same way.
