ARE YOU REGISTERED.—The last election law passed, commonly called the Registry Act, requires the Assessors throughout the State to assess or register the names of the voters in their re-spective districts prior to the first day of August in each year, and return the same to the County Commissioners, who shall cause one copy of the list con-taining the names of sald voters to be who shall cause one copy of the list containing the names of said voters to be placed on the door of the house where the election is required to be held, and another copy of the same shall be kept in possession of the Assessor for the inspection, free of charge, of any person within his election district. It is also the duty of the Assessors to add to their list, from time to time, on personal application, the name of any one claiming the right to vote. On the 10th day preceding the general election in October, the Assessor shall produce the list in his possession to the Inspectors and Judge of Election of his district, who shall then sit a specified time for the purpose of receiving the names of persons not already on the list and deciding upon their right to vote.

The new law, however is already familiar to most of our readers. We simply call attention to that portion of it requiring persons to be assessed, that voters may in time have their names upon the list, and not defer the matter until the eve of election, and probably by such neglect deprive themselves of the privilege of voting at all,—Hollidaysburg Standard.

GREAT EXCITEMENT—Skeleton of a man found.—On Monday evening the citizens of West Ward, of this place, were thrown into a state of excitement by the statement of some frightened boys who reported that while gathering acorns on the hill above town, and not far from the Centralia road, they had come across the skeleton of a murdered man. A large number of men repaired to the spot, and there found the body, or rather the skeleton of an unknown man, so decomposed that but little flesh remained on his bones. His head was detached from and lay some distance from the body, and alongside lay a revolver. There was nothing found on the clothes whereby to identify the body, although it is said the coat contained a diary kept in German, but that no name was visible. A small amount of change was found in one of his pockets. Coroner Murphy of Centralia summoned a jury who held an inquest, and rendered a verdict of death from some unknown cause. From the fact that there has been no mysterious disappearance of any one from this neighborhood, the general supposition is, that the unknown was a stranger who, tired of life, had caused his own death. Time however, may develop a different state of facts. The place where the body was found is in Columbia county.—Ashland Adeocate.
