HON. ELLIS LEWIS, formerly Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania, died at his residence in West Philadelphia, on Sunday last, aged 73.

European News.

Paris is in a state of insurrection. In an endeavor to suppress the "Red" mobs, the troops fraternized with the rioters, surrendering their generals to them, who were speedily murdered, although all of them had been greatly distinguished in the struggle against the Prussians. The government is inefficient if not powerless. The Germans have, in consequence of these events, stopped their march of evacuation and threaten to return to Paris. If they are compelled to take this step, they will of course settle matters effectually before they proceed to evacuate the country again. The turbulent population of Paris has not been kept in thorough subordination to law for a century past, except by the Bonapartes, and they are sure to destroy any Republic that may be set up. Republican leaders can use them to detrom monarchs but cannot govern them afterwards.

Their public assemblies and their mobs ring with cries for blood, for revenge, for capital execution of their political opponents, a law and public authority is defied by mobs, and newspapers that encourage such proceedings are liberally supported by the very people who are begging most pitifully for charitable aid! We read, too, that the Theatre and other places of public amusement are all open and well patronized.
