MCQUEEN'S Tannery, near Jerseytown, was entirely destroyed by fire on Friday night last. His stable and wagon shed were also destroyed, together with nearly the entire contents of the tannery etc. It is not known how the fire started. Insurance \$2,300, which will not nearly cover the loss.

We have heard much of the superiority of Italian Bees, and it now appears too that they are No. 1 in the way of reproduction. A new swarm made its appearance from a hive belonging to Mr. H. H. BROWNE, of Light Street, on the 9th ult. They seemed abundant in numbers and vigorous in health. It is said of this variety of bees that they possess a rare merit of doubtful morality, that of stealing the honey of other bees in their vicinity. Great capacity to gather honey is also attributed to them.

A SERIOUS ACCIDENT—On last Monday afternoon Mrs. ELIZABETH KRAMER, wife of WM. B. KRAMER, went to the barn to fix nests and search for eggs. She came out at the front door, where was a pair of steep steps. She slipped very suddenly off of the bottom step, it not being nailed solid, which threw her with much force on the step, breaking three of her ribs and otherwise injuring her internally. Dr. CHAS. W. BROWN skillfully attended to the case, and though he says it is somewhat serious gives hopes of her recovery soon. The lady is nearly seventy years old.

WE are informed by one of the neighbors of Mr. JOSEPH J. THOMAS, late of Roaringcreek township, who came to his death by suffocation in a smokehouse, that the house was not arranged in any manner with a view to trapping thieves. It had been originally constructed for a Bee house, without the least reference to thieves, but with double doors for the winter protection of the bees. Not answering the purpose for which it was constructed, it was used for a smokehouse, and was entered as stated, and was suffocated by the smoke. He fell against and across the inner door, which closed and held it shut, as it opened inwardly. He would have had no difficulty in opening it had he not been strangled. This correction is made at the request of the family who felt aggrieved by the former report.

DESTRUCTIVE FIRE—The Montour Patent Works at Rupert caught fire about 9 o'clock, on Monday morning and were entirely consumed. The fire originated in the Fire Room of the Engine house and rapidly communicated with the main buildings. The excellent arrangement for smothering the fire by steam proved a failure on account of the windows being broken in. The flames were an outside draught. The extensive machinery was entirely destroyed. The mills were now having been in operation only about six weeks. The loss in property was probably about \$10,000 but this covers but a small portion of the real loss. Our enterprising citizens Messrs. DEBER & HAY are thrown out of business for a time and the whole community suffers in consequence. The extensive warehouses of PANTON & HARMAN was on fire several times, but the flames were in each case extinguished. Their loss will reach probably 500 or 600 dollars. When the dense volume of smoke were seen, our Fire Company hurried to the scene of conflagration and were present in fifteen minutes from the time they left town, and saved many thousands dollars worth of property. It is conceded that the buildings of PANTON & HARMAN would have been consumed had it not been for the timely assistance of the Fire Company. They deserve the thanks of the community for the energy they displayed, and we earnestly hope they may have the material aid that they need in order to fully equip themselves. We understand that the property was covered by insurance.—Republican.

P. S.—On returning from the fire, a polished steel screw from an arm of the Engine was lost. Any person finding it would do a great favor to return it to the company.
